Featured National Society:

The Croatian Physiological Society

After the dissolution of the Yugoslavian Physiological Society, Croatian Physiological Society (CPS) was founded in 1999 with the purpose of promoting physiology and related biomedical sciences in research and teaching. The idea of forming the society grew over the years from the need to connect physiologists from all Croatian universities and institutes, so that they may share their research and expertise. The first significant step was the Meeting of Chairmen of Physiology Departments which took place in 1997. Representatives from the Universities of Zagreb, Rijeka, Split, and Mostar convened and worked hard to establish CPS mere 2 years later. CPS was represented by its 1st president, academician Daniel Rukavina, and its Executive Council (3 vice-presidents, 4 members and secretary). The first official CPS Meeting took place in 2000 in Zagreb, followed closely by the 1st Congress of the Croatian Physiological Society held in Osijek (Picture 1).

CPS continues to grow and evolve and today numbers 127 active members from 4 largest Croatian universities (Zagreb, Rijeka, Split, Osijek) and prestigious research institutes. Since its inception, it has organized 15 Annual meetings with international participation, 3 regional congresses of physiological societies and 5 congresses of the CPS. The last regional conference took place this autumn in Plitvice Lakes National Park, co-organized with the Slovenian Physiological Society and supported by both the Federation of European Physiological Societies and the International Union of Physiological Societies. The congress was attended by 181 registered participants from 16 countries (Picture 2). A memorable keynote lecture titled „Gas diffusion through membrane proteins“ was delivered by prof. Walter F. Boron. 11 guest speakers from

prestigious European and American universities delivered invited lectures covering a broad range of topics: sport physiology, endocrinology, cardiovascular physiology, neurophysiology, cell physiology and immunology. Registered participants were invited to share their research through either oral or poster presentations, and CPS awarded best 3 presentations in either category.

Over 2 decades, CPS has aimed to encourage, aid and promote physiology research in Croatia. This has been achieved in several ways, one of which is the organisation of Annual meetings where scientists from the field of physiology can gather and share experiences. CPS is also active in encouraging and advancing scientific research and organizes a yearly competition where its members may enter their published research articles and win prizes. On an international level, CPS members hold memberships in various European and American physiological societies and regularly attend their meetings, in this way representing CPS, ensuring greater dissemination of their research results and establishing long-term working relationships between different institutions. Many members are also employed at Croatian Universities, where they teach numerous courses in physiology and help nurture new generations of research scientists and medical professionals. Motivated students are given opportunities to be involved in projects from various physiology areas, helping them deepen their knowledge and providing them with experience needed later on in their careers.
